The significant environmental improvements made in creating the Trall include:

1.3 kilometres of new surfaced path created as part of the Trail





22 acres of land fenced and grassland brought back under management using grazing by Highland Cattle to benefit adflowers and local wildlife

The land management is taking place under the monitoring of Natural England by their Higher Level Stewardship Scheme.

12,243 trees & hedgerow plants planted also 64,000 bulbs & 1,500 square metres of wildflowers seed sown.

Eco Surveys

A number of biological surveys have been carried out over the years in Owlthorpe by the Ecology Department of Sheffield City Council to establish the levels of Fauna and Flora that exists in the area. These records of 843 species have been added to the Biological Records Centre RECORDER database.

The following lists give an indication of the biological diversity of species including Ancient Woodland Indicators that can be seen on the Trail are as follows:

Vertebrates 96 species in total

78 species of Birds

16 species of Mammals

1 species each of Amphibian & Reptile

<u>Invertebrates</u> 295 species in total including 95 species of Butterflies & Moths

Flora 452 species in total

New species are being added to the list as they are found. In the first two months of 2017 the following new species were discovered:




